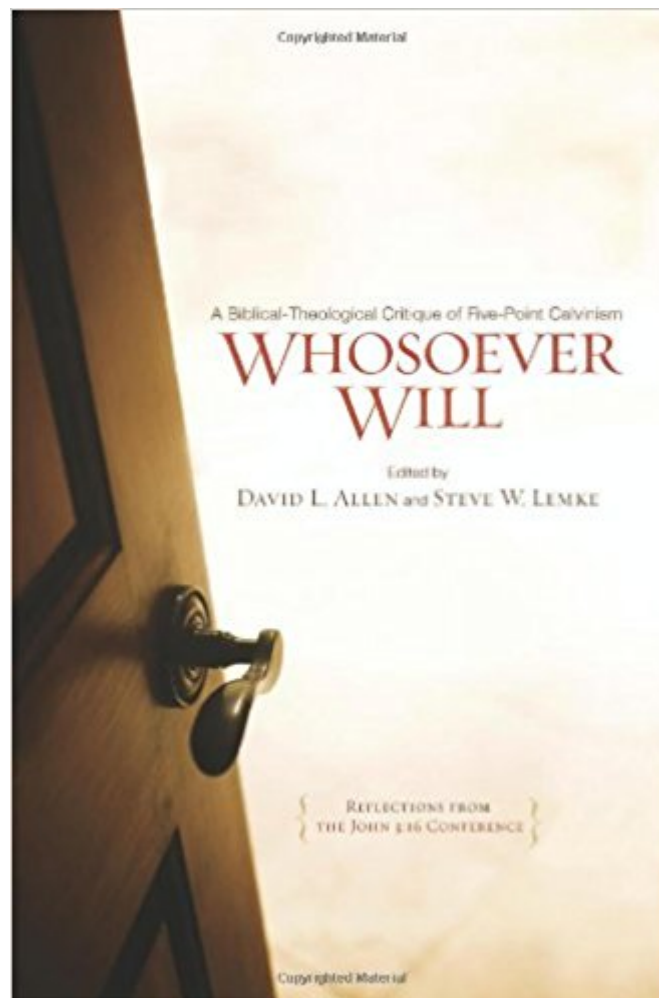




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Whosoever Will: A Biblical-Theological Critique Of Five-Point Calvinism

This book, edited by Drs. Allen and Lemke, is a critical resource in today's ongoing conversation regarding Neo-Calvinism. Part One offers a point by point discussion and evaluation of the Canons of Dort, often with options presented in some detail. Part Two offers an analysis of a handful of related questions such as, "How 'Calvinistic' was Calvin himself?" Their work is on point and clearly presented. The book is a collection of essays written by various scholars in the field. As such, it delves deeply into the issues addressed, but not so that the more casual reader cannot follow with comprehension. It is a very readable book and immensely relevant to today's church. I recommend it highly to those who are searching for a more objective, well-rounded, scholarly yet practical discussion of the issues.

This particular book was a God-send. For years Calvinism has bothered me. Although it seems irrefutable, from a theological perspective it still "felt" (for lack of a better word) off.
